Management of suspected / confirmed cases of Measles

Community settings

- If triage of the patient has identified that measles is suspected or confirmed consider the below:
 - o Unvaccinated or partially vaccinated with MMR (measles, mumps and rubella)
 - o Recent travel to an area where measles is circulating
 - o Contact with confirmed or suspected case of measles
- If remote consultation is not possible and in-person review is needed patients with suspected or confirmed measles attending our services, should be separated in space and / or time between patients
- Patients attending with suspected measles infection should be prioritised for assessment / treatment and isolated at the time of arrival (for example, directed straight to a consultation room on arrival)
- Appointments should be scheduled to reduce waiting times in reception areas (where necessary) and avoid cross-over of infectious and no-infectious patients.
- If transfer from a primary care facility to a hospital is required, ambulance services should be informed of the infectious status of the patient. Patient confidentiality must be maintained.
- Patients attending without prior notification should ideally be screened and triaged at the reception or entrance, this would include:
 Asking the patient if they have a rash, cold like symptoms and a temperature
- Patients with suspected measles should not wait in communal areas or reception areas and should be placed in a segregated area (ideally a single room away from others) as soon as possible. Please refer to the 'Transmission based precautions (TBPs) and Isolation' action card. All action cards are available on StaffZone search 'measles'
- If the patient has confirmed or suspected measles, then if possible/tolerated the patient should wear a surgical face mask (type I/II/IIR) in communal areas (for example, during transfer). The request for patients to wear a facemask must never compromise their clinical care.

PPE

Staff should wear the following PPE when assessing or managing patients with confirmed or suspected measles:

- single-use, disposable gloves
- single-use, disposable apron or gown if extensive splashing or spraying, or performing an aerosol generating procedure (AGP)
- respiratory protective equipment (FFP3) FFP3 should only be worn by staff who have been fit tested for the appropriate mask as without correct fit testing, the mask will not provide adequate protection
- eye/face protection (goggles or visor)
